#### **COUNTY WAIVERS**

On September 2, Alameda County Office of Education (in cooperation with Alameda County Public Health Department) announced <u>plans to reopen the elementary school waiver process</u> to resume in-person instruction in counties on the state's coronavirus watchlist. We started preparing for the waiver application in early August while we waited for notice that this was a possibility. One of the waiver application requirements is that school leadership consult with "all parent and labor organizations" (or school site staff) prior to submitting an application. In order to move forward in the waiver process we will need to collect survey responses from the majority of our community. Please keep your eyes open for a survey late next week.

## **Lower School:**

It was such fun to welcome all our new Kindergarten students this week! Teachers saw lots of happy faces and felt their enthusiasm for the new year. Kids got to know what is in their supply kit through a scavenger hunt or jeopardy games. Grades 1-3 have started using Seesaw and the teachers are impressed with their tech savviness using this program. They already have it figured out and are using all the tools the platform offers. They are sharing about themselves and their identity through words, photos, videos and drawings. In first grade, as a part of community building, they are writing about two things that make them feel welcome. In third and fourth grade the kids are working on a time capsule. Third graders are finding the circumference of their head, and fourth graders are writing about themselves. Third graders are also starting a project on homes and communities. They are starting with drawings representing where they live and will be building 3D models and putting them together to make a community.

### Middle School:

When we asked our Middle Schoolers how the start of school was, this is some of what we heard: "It was epic!" "The most structure I've had in months," and of course the ever-teenish "better than expected." Patience and kindness showed up big time throughout our community yesterday and today. We're so proud of our students for showing resilience and self advocacy as they navigate this new school year. As we ramp up in humanities, math/science, Spanish, the arts, and more, students are also starting to learn about Passion Projects. Passion Project time will be dedicated asynchronous time for the students to explore a passion of theirs that they are deeply interested in yet are not experts about yet. Advisors will use one on one check in time to brainstorm ideas with students, provide ideas, and check in on progress related to this project.
